Avengers Endgame: What You Need to Know Going In

On Friday, April 26th, Marvel finished their 22-movie saga with *Avengers: Endgame*, ending a story that started 11 years ago with the release of *Iron Man*. Endgame has already shattered the ticket pre-sale records and will most likely become the highest grossing movie of all time when it's theatrical run is through. While many, many people will go see this monumental movie, the level of familiarity with the vast Marvel Cinematic Universe varies from proficient to those who have never seen a Marvel movie before. But if you're planning to see Endgame, there is a lot of background information that is needed of the previous 22 Marvel movies that have led up to Endgame. O if you aren't interested in sitting in a 3-hour movie and spending the whole time saying, "who's that?" and "what is going on?", I'd recommend you read this quick recap of the important information of the Marvel universe. There are spoilers ahead for the previous Marvel movies, so be warned.

I'll start with a quick character run down of the major players in the Marvel universe. While these are just four characters in a movie with around 20 different superheroes, these are by far the most important Avengers, and most of the Marvel Universe has centered around these four heroes.

- Tony Stark/Iron Man- The one that started it all. Tony Stark is a billionaire and tech genius who also is the superhero Iron Man. Tony has been a member of the Avengers since they began, and has appeared in 9 Marvel movies thus far, including 3 solo Iron Man movies. While he can be arrogant and sarcastic, Tony always does what he thinks is right and has even mentored a younger superhero, Spiderman. Iron Man and Captain America also had a falling out and have not seen each other since they fought in *Captain America: Civil War*, which was released in 2016.
- Steve Rogers/Captain America- Born in Brooklyn in the 1920's, Steve Rogers went from skinny kid to super soldier after he was experimented on by the US government. Rogers fought for the US during world war 2 as Captain America but was frozen in ice for 70 years after he crashed a plane filled with bombs into the arctic ocean. Captain America is the de facto leader of the Avengers and is always a great teammate and overall good person. He was accused of treason by the US government and was on the run for 2 years until the events of Avengers: Infinity War.
- **Thor** The God of Thunder, Thor might be the most powerful hero. Thor controls the power of lightning, and up until *Thor: Ragnarok*, used a magical hammer to fight his enemies. And while might be the most powerful hero, he has also suffered the most, as he is the only remaining Asgardian after Thanos destroyed a ship carrying the rest of his people and killed his brother in front of him.
- **Bruce Banner/The Hulk** Bruce Banner is a mild-mannered scientist, but when you get him angry, he turns into the monster known as the Hulk. Banner has had trouble controlling his Hulk side throughout the Marvel Universe, and most recently was unable to get his Hulk side to come out in Infinity War, after Hulk got beat up by Thanos.

Now for a rundown of the events of *Avengers: Infinity War*, the most recent movie in the Marvel Cinematic Universe chronologically. In Infinity War, the Avengers faced their biggest threat yet in the form of Thanos, an 8-foot-tall purple alien who was first introduced at the very end of the original *Avengers* movie in 2012. Thanos is from the planet Titan, where he proposed the radical idea of getting rid of half the population randomly in an attempt to save the planet from overusing their resources. He was labeled a madman, and exiled. Titan ended up going extinct due to overuse of resources, and since then Thanos's mission has

been simple: to "balance" the universe by wiping out half the population. While this would be very hard to do by going to planet to planet, Thanos came up with the plan to collect the infinity stones. The infinity stones are the most powerful objects in the universe. There are 6 infinity stones: The mind stone, the space stone, the power stone, the reality stone, the time stone, and the soul stone. These stones are scattered throughout the universe and have appeared sporadically throughout the Marvel Universe. With all six of these stones, Thanos could kill half the universe with the snap of his fingers. The Avengers, and the rest of the heroes in the universe set out to stop Thanos in his quest for the stones. But with every stone Thanos added to his Infinity Gauntlet, Thanos grew stronger and the Avengers and the rest of the heroes were sadly unable to stop him, and Thanos snapped his fingers and wiped out half the universe. The heroes that remained after the snap were Captain America, Iron Man, Hulk, Thor, Black Widow, Rocket Racoon, War Machine, Ant Man, and Hawkeye. SAP Teams are a requirement for every school district, giving students a chance to get support. The Student Assistance Program (SAP) at PR has the goal of figuring out what is best for an individual student.

The individual may be referred to SAP after struggling or becoming distracted in their classes as well as other needs that a student may want to discuss. Ms. Lang and Mr. Devinney are two teachers as well as certified SAP members. Each teacher who is certified as a part of the program is assigned two to five students to meet up with at least once per week. Every SAP teacher has an assigned to meet with students.
