



PASSAVANT MEMORIAL HOMES FOUNDATION AWARDS \$10,000 COMMUNITY SERVICE SCHOLARSHIP TO LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATE

Passavant Memorial Homes Foundation (PMHF) recently announced the recipient of its 2021 Community Service Scholarship. This scholarship was created to honor the memory of Jamie Ellenberger, an individual served by Passavant Memorial Homes Family of Services (PMHFOS) who was an active member in the community.

The principle of community is central to the PMHFOS mission, including efforts to engage in community initiatives and to be involved in community improvements.

PMHF aimed to award a scholarship to a student in the region who brings that same understanding of the value of community service, and this was found in Sydney Komoroski of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart High School (OLSH). Her lengthy and impressive resume of community service began in 2014 when, for her birthday party, she asked guests to bring Easter baskets for the children of North Hills Community Outreach instead of gifts.

In addition to hosting a party like that each year thereafter, Komoroski has volunteered for St. Alexis, Aquinas Academy, and the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. She has also completed various service projects for the Little Sisters of the Poor, Satchels of Caring, Light of Life Missions, Yellow Ribbon Girls, and Vincentian Home.

Komoroski is a member of LeadersNow International and the Girls Scouts of America, where she is working to earn her Gold Award. She has hosted a five-weeklong Peanut Butter and Jelly Food Drive for North Hills Community Outreach, and she helped at her high school with Open Houses, galas, Freshman Foundation Day, and Transfer Student Welcome Day.

Komoroski has baked cookies for the troops, served meals at soup kitchens, and built a Little Free Library for North Hills Community Outreach in its outdoor vegetable garden. She has also helped rescue sea turtles, volunteered at her local library, and made seatbelt pillows for cancer patients with ports.

In addition to her community involvement, Komoroski has been involved in several extracurricular activities. She was a member of her high school bowling team, was in the concert choir, served as an OLSH Ambassador, and was part of the theater program, where she participated in 17 productions. She is also a member of the OLSH Honor Roll.

Komoroski will be attending Walsh University in North Canton, Ohio, where she will study nursing.

This year, PMHF received 72 scholarship applications from students across 19 counties in Pennsylvania. Sydney Komoroski exemplifies the commitment of PMHF and the late Jamie Ellenberger to serving and improving the community.



On the Menu:

A fresh take on modern Italian fare, the menu begins with Antipasti ranging from Castelvetrano Olives, Tuna Tartare, Burrata (oven-roasted tomatoes with garlic confit, basil on grilled focaccia), Fried Calamari, Warm Ricotta Toast (grilled with sweet & spicy peppers, oregano) and Spring Pea Arancini, to a varietal list of Verdura (fresh vegetables), including Vignarola, Beans and Greens, Mushrooms, Baby **Artichokes and Roasted Brussels Sprouts** with Cauliflower. There is also Little Gem Romaine and Roasted Beets under Insalata, plus Brussels Sprouts folded with black currants, Honeycrisp apples, roasted garlic vinaigrette, Pecorina Romano and pine nuts. The pasta selection is immersed with jumbo lump crab meat (the Gemelli); crispy chicken breast with provolone, Parmigiano Reggiano in a roasted tomato sauce and basil (the Spaghetti); a mushroom Bolognese with fresh ricotta (the Mafaldine); a Five-Cheese Ravioli; Fettucine; Bucatini with Red Cow Parmesan, Pecorino and Romano; Rigatoni; Lumache with pork and veal meatballs; and Pappardelle with beef short rib sugo and strac-



ciatella. "From the hearth" or Focolare side of the menu has a range of savory dishes, such as the Laurel Hill Trout with Yukon Gold potatoes, hen of the woods, grilled scallion and salsa verde; salmon with a spring pea puree; Gerber Farms Chicken with crispy parmesan potatoes; pork chop; and a bone-in Strip Steak Florentine. The menu concludes with Dolce of chocolate or vanilla gelato, tiramisu, olive oil cake, or a hazelnut-chocolate torte. Plus, there are specialty cocktails and wine to go.



I've always wanted to do an Italian restaurant and my

partners would say it doesn't sound interesting. But it wasn't the red-checkered-table-clothand-red-sauce Italian restaurant they thought I meant. I guess I was just never clear enough describing my vision. I wanted to study some ideas we were seeing around the country and emulate pasta-forward restaurants that are

We were talking, and there were these great places in New York and San Francisco that had a modern Italian concept—and that's what I was talking about. We looked into it further and were inspired to have house-made pasta and vegetables. It finally came together. The naming of a restaurant is usually a challenge. We talked and talked, and our CEO came up with Alta Via, referring to an old trail in the Italian Alps. The name reflects the vegetabledriven menu and a coalescing of Italy and Northern California; with that feeling of going out for an all-day hike while shopping for local vegetables and spices. The plan fell together, and we opened in the spring of 2019.

Describe how you curate the modern Italian menu.

The way I work with all of our restaurants [as corporate chef and President of big Burrito Restaurant Group, overseeing Mad Mex, Casbah, Kaya, Eleven, Soba, Umi and Alta Via Ristorante] is each one has an executive chef. We work out menu ideas and make our modifications from there to curate each unique menu. For instance, we [do a] summer Pasta Fest menu for Casbah. Dustin, the executive

chef, will write an initial menu and we will work through it together, making a dish or two if we feel we need to. Alta Via partially came out of these seasonal pasta menus at Casbah.

What kitchen tool can't you live without?

My knife is my main tool, and I don't share it—ever. In terms of my business tool, it's hands-down my phone. I'm on it all day, texting and sending emails. There's this app that shows what sales are and who's checked in—I couldn't do all that I have to do without it.

What's your favorite quick meal to prepare at home?

I have a daughter, Zoe, who is finishing her sophomore year at college and a son, Jake, who is a junior in high school. I make ricotta cheese cavatelli with egg and flour and freeze it. I'll cook up some sausage, and some homecanned tomato sauce, a chunk of butter, toss the cavatelli in, and top it with fresh ricotta cheese—basically our Casbah cavatelli. Boom!

What's your favorite go-to ingredient?

I like using Calabrian Chile peppers. They're hot, but so good.

What's your best advice for a novice?

I learned to master the basics and attribute my thinking to Pablo Picasso. He said to learn the rules like a pro, so you can break them like an artist. If you don't know how to do something right, you can't get creative.

What's the next big food or dining trend?

We're adding Alta Via Pizzeria in Bakery Square this fall. It has the look and feel of Alta Via Ristorante, but with a pizza focus—offering California-style and square Sicilian-style pie.







he past two years brought about changes to every element of our lives, forcing us into a new reality. Educators, students, and parents across the globe scrambled to reinvent the school day—what was once a reliable constant in our daily lives. Parents adjusted work schedules to act as a teacher's helper, they set up mini classrooms in a corner of their homes to create a workspace that was adequate for their children to learn, and tried providing a sense of normalcy in what was a far-from-normal time.

Students of all ages learned a digital way to communicate with their peers and their teachers, blowing the screen time recommendation limit out of the water with daylong online learning. Teachers reinvented ways to connect with their students, recreating a classroom in their own home, working tirelessly to develop ways to not only educate, but entertain students who struggled with online learning.

No one came out of a year of online learning unscathed, but as the great Albert Einstein once said, "In the midst of every crisis lies great opportunity." The education system across the world is rethinking the way students learn. While it is undoubtable that most students learn best in person, benefiting from both social interactions and one-on-one attention, there is a desire to continue optional virtual learning. In many instances, virtual learning meets a need for students with certain medical conditions, others who may have transportation challenges, or those who simply prefer to learn virtually.

What the entire education community learned through a global pandemic is that change is possible. Some changes came out of necessity and fell flat, while others proved to be a beneficial addition to the way students learn and teachers teach.

Where Virtual Learning Falls Short

Technology-forward schools likely saw an easier transition to virtual learning simply because students already had the technology they needed. A computer or tablet and reliable internet are two things many students only have while they are in the classroom. The pandemic brought to light the inequities between socioeconomically advantaged and disadvantaged schools based on access to technology. Even families in advantaged schools struggled with the ability to provide multiple children the resources needed to all be online at the same time.

Increasing access for students in need was also slow on the uptake. Many teachers turned to their own resources to aid students when and where possible. Yet, even as students received access to adequate technology, there was a learning curve for students, teachers, and parents alike. Teachers needed to quickly learn how to adapt lesson plans to an online platform, while learning the new technology themselves. On the other end of the computer screen, students and parents scrambled to install learning platforms, locate the mute/unmute button, and learn best practices on how and when to use the camera.

It was almost overnight that virtual learning was adopted and considered the way for the near-term future. While many schools returned to hybrid or in-person learning, there are still challenges that schools are addressing for technology and the future of education.



Trends for 2022:

- Increased access Policy makers, school administrations, and teachers say there's no going back to the way things were prior to the pandemic. Although many districts are going back to in-person learning, the need and desire for a more structured option for virtual learning is clear. - 10. Education Although the field of education is changing dramatically, the demand for quality educators remains high. Teachers can choose to teach in person or online, depending on the type of school and the subject.


Trade and Technical Schools

Trade school enrollment continues to increase since the early 2000s, but a steep decline in vocational education in the 1980s and '90s led to a shortage of skilled workers across the nation. The need to gain back these critical workers has meant an increase in wages and jobs, encouraging students and parents to see past an old stigma of choosing vocational school over college. Plus, over the past 30 years, the cost to attend a four-year college has increased by 213 percent, leaving some students wanting to avoid the hefty price tag of a four-year degree.

• Licensed Practical Nurse (LPN) - Working under the direction of doctors and registered nurses, LPNs are responsible for updating patient charts and keeping doctors and nurses up-to-date on patient health changes. LPNs work long shifts and can work in a hospital, outpatient facility, nursing home, or other caregiving facility.

- HVAC Technician Installing, repairing, replacing, and maintaining systems are all part of an HVAC tech's role. Heating, ventilation, refrigeration, and air-conditioning systems are required to properly maintain workplaces, hospitals, and homes, among other buildings.
- Home Inspector Ensuring the safety of a home or building is the main job of home inspectors. They are required to be familiar with all types of systems that are in a home including heating, electrical, plumbing, and the overall structural system of a home. Being a home inspector requires you to be physically fit and capable of climbing ladders and crawling through small spaces during inspection.
- **Plumber** Not only responsible for unclogging toilets and drains, but plumbers also often install and repair gas supply lines as well. It's critical to understand the flow of these systems and to problem-solve and troubleshoot when issues arise within them.
- **Electrician** Training to become an electrician takes about as long as it takes to get a bachelor's degree and a license, but this job training pays for itself along the way. If reading blueprints and installing or repairing wires and other electrical components interests you, this career might be electrifying.
- Landscape Designer If you enjoy the outdoors and gardening, look into landscape design. These professionals offer plans on designing outdoor spaces for residential and commercial settings that take into account environmental challenges, features that are meant to be emphasized, and overall aesthetics.
- **Respiratory Therapist** Respiratory therapists work with patients who have breathing difficulties, and also aid in emergency situations such as drowning, heart attack, or shock. They assess patients' respiratory needs and make sure they're receiving proper care through breathing treatments.

- Ultrasonographer After obtaining an associate degree, sonographers go on to prepare patients for procedures, review and process images for physicians, and administer ultrasounds. They are also responsible for operating imaging equipment.

Types of Educational Loans

Getting into college is one of the most exciting times of a student's life and is the first step in shaping a variety of careers. Many colleges and universities offer a myriad of grants or scholarships to assist with paying for postsecondary education, but often these are not enough. Student loans provide financial assistance for students to cover the costs associated with attending a college or career school, including tuition, supplies, books, and living expenses. There are several types of loans available including need-based, non-need-based, state, and private.

Need-based loans are provided to students who are unable to pay the amount needed to cover all costs to attend college.

Need is determined by the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), which can be completed online at no cost. Need-based loans are available as a Federal Perkins Loan, awarded to students with the highest need, or a Federal Direct Subsidized Loan, provided interest-free while in college.


If FAFSA determines that a student is ineligible for a need-based loan, non-needbased loan options are available as a Federal Direct Unsubsidized Loan or Federal Direct PLUS Loan. Unsubsidized loans allow the borrower to add interest to the total amount borrowed after graduation, but beware: this leads to owing even more money when it comes time to start paying off the loan. Direct PLUS Loans provide graduate students or parents the opportunity to borrow the total cost of attending college, minus other financial aid received.

Unlike the loans mentioned above that are sponsored by the federal government, state and private loans are sponsored by banks, colleges, foundations, and state agencies. The U.S. Department of Education manages all college loans available by state and requires students to be in-state residents or enrolled in a college in that state. Private loans are an option for borrowers but come with terms and conditions that may not be as favorable as federal loans. Private loans also require a cosigner who is responsible for repaying the money if the student fails to do so.

Managing Debt After College

Student loan debt continues to increase and has become a burden on both graduates and the U.S. economy. There are a variety of loan repayment options for students. Here are some tips on how to approach repayment:

- Figure out what you'll owe and start to save early. Creating a budget early will allow you to build a solid foundation for repayment after graduation. Setting aside money each month toward future savings for repayment will set you up for success come graduation day.
- **Understand your repayment options.** There are several different options available to start paying off student loans based on the type of loan you received. Common federal loan plans include standard, graduated, extended, or income-based.
 - Standard plans are payments in fixed amounts that ensure that loans are paid off in 10-30 years (these payments are often very high for new graduates).
 - Graduated plans are payments that start out lower and increase every two years, also ensuring that loans are paid off within 10-30 years (based on loan). This plan assumes you'll continue to make more money as you continue your career path, so additional money is allotted to repayment as you go.
 - Extended plans may be made in a fixed amount or a graduated amount and ensure payment in full within 25 years.
 - Income-based plans take 10-15 percent of your discretionary income, and are recalculated each year. Once you are married, your spouse's income will also be considered if filing jointly on tax returns. Any outstanding balance on the loan will be forgiven after 20-25 years.
- Consolidate for ease. If you have multiple federal loans, consolidating them into one can make repayment easier. But there may be fees or other conditions associated with consolidating, so be sure to do your research.



Hire a professional for this job, since reputable wood repair companies won't settle for only repairing visibly damaged wood. They'll make sure to do a thorough inspection and remove and repair both the wood you can see and the wood you can't.

8. Caulk or re-caulk your windows and doors.

Water, bugs and drafty winds all love the nooks and crannies that unsealed or poorly sealed windows and doors provide. Like wood repair, exterior caulking and sealing isn't a project that is going to give you a noticeable visual payoff, but it can save you money on your heating and cooling bills.

If it's been a while since you've caulked and sealed around your windows and doors, this fall might be the right time. It's a project that's often simple enough for DIYers but will go much faster—and without the risk of mistakes—with a professional.

9. Re-mulch your perennials.

You already know you should mulch in late spring/early summer, but fall can also be a good time to spread one more layer to protect your flower beds until spring. Mulch will protect the base and roots of your perennials, so they come up healthy and whole next spring. The best part of this project is that it





typically can be tackled in one day, and without the blistering sun of the summer.

10. Prep your fireplace.

If you're lucky enough to have a fireplace, fall is the right time to make sure it's in good working order for those long winter months. If you regularly maintain your fireplace, you might not have too much work to do. But if it's been several years, it's time to bring in a pro who can do a full inspection and clean and repair your chimney or flue as needed.

Fireplaces can be extremely dangerous when they're not properly maintained, and you'll want to make sure your winter is both warm and safe.

11. Check on your home's heating and air.

Don't get caught in the cold with a broken furnace – add an HVAC check to your fall home checklist. Older furnaces can be up to 50 percent less efficient than newer models.

If a replacement isn't in the cards, here are a few HVAC tips for winter from Bob Burkholder, owner and president of Burkholder's Heating and Air Conditioning:

- Check Air Filters. Replace your air conditioning filter before shutting it down, and stay on top of furnace filter changes throughout the heating months to keep your system working properly.
- Clean Up Your Outdoor Unit. If you have an outdoor unit, double-check for any debris or damage. Remove all debris around the unit to ensure the proper air flow and to prevent dirt or leaves getting on the coils or inside the unit.
- **Schedule a Tune-Up.** The number-one thing homeowners should do to make sure their HVAC system is ready for winter is to schedule a tune-up with a licensed heating and air conditioning contractor. During a tune-up, most HVAC contractors inspect, clean, and test all safety controls so you know that your equipment is operating correctly and safely.

12. Winterize your driveway and sidewalks.

Most people don't give their driveway a second thought when winterizing the home. However, snow, ice and salt can take a toll on concrete and asphalt surfaces. Make sure they're ready to be put to the test with these tips for winterizing your driveway:

- Pull Weeds. If grass or weeds have sprung up throughout your driveway or sidewalk, pluck them out before fixing and sealing the gaps.
- **Repair Cracks.** During the winter, water can collect in and worsen existing cracks in concrete and asphalt. Use concrete caulk to patch hairline cracks and concrete sealer to fix larger gaps. For cracks in asphalt driveways, applying asphalt crack sealer will do the trick.
- **Seal Expansion Joints.** It's important to seal concrete expansion joints with polyurethane caulk prior to wintertime to prevent water from seeping in and freezing.
- **Clean and Seal the Surface.** Before the temperatures drop below 40 degrees, pressure-wash your driveway and seal it with a concrete or asphalt sealer to prevent damage from snow and salt.


